Below are a few examples {and their corresponding page numbers} using the *Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association (APA)*. The **final authority** for the bibliographic form, including spacing of the references used in your paper, **is your professor**.

BOOKS

The following information may be necessary for your citation:

1. Author(s)'s last name(s) and first initial(s) (if known)
2. Year of publication
3. Title of book/monograph
4. Publication information: place, publisher's name, etc.

The following information may be necessary for your citation:

1. Author(s)' s last name(s) and first initials (if known)
2. Date of source/periodical
3. Title of article/document
4. Title of source/periodical
5. Publication info: volume, issue, page nos. (if known)
